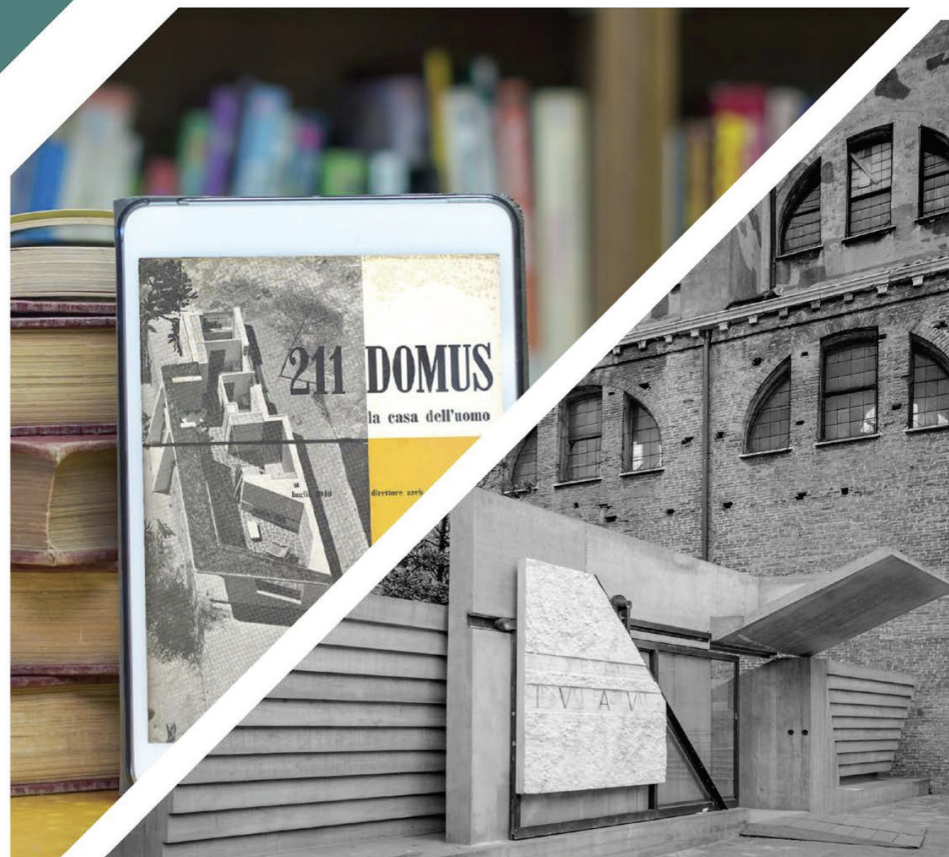

Diversity and collections

The presentation will explore theoretical and practical approaches to diversity and collections: touching on the value of diversity as a term, the influence of critical librarianship, and the strategies of diversification and decolonisation. The presentation will describe some recent activity at UAL, and also explore what might be particular to architecture as a discipline, in these contexts.

10.00 –10.40 Carol Keddie, Senior Assistant Librarian, Library and Learning Services, De Montfort University.

How the library service at DMU has been involved in the institution-wide initiatives focussing on globalism, diversity and sustainability.

De Montfort University has been involved in some exciting initiatives relating to inclusivity, globalism and sustainability. We have recently been named the first University of the Year for Social Inclusion by the Times/Sunday Times and our DMU Global programme has been enormously successful in enriching studies, broadening cultural horizons and developing key skills for our students. We are also now the lead higher education institute in the UN's JoinTogether campaign, which will see all 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals embedded in to the curriculum and incorporated into all aspects of DMU's learning, teaching and research. This presentation will focus on these initiatives and how Library and Learning Services has engaged and been involved with them all.

From Architecture Schools to the Studio: mapping tools architects use in the Open Source age.

Looking at the correlation between the mapping and GIS applications available to students in Schools of Architecture, and those used by architects and urban designers in the workplace, with a particular emphasis on Open Source applications, this paper will open with a presentation by built environment librarian and tutor in Sustainable Urbanism Carla Marchesan, showing the results of three surveys sent to practicing architects, architecture libraries and lecturers in built environment disciplines.

To demonstrate the practical application of Open Source mapping tools in both educational and work contexts, Architect Vito De Bellis will give an overview of two case studies, one part of a field work based MA assignment in North London, the other part of a study carried out within the scope of the Puglia Regional Landscape Territorial Plan, both using Open Source mapping tools.

15.30 – 15.40 Eleanor Gawne, Librarian, Architectural Association

Benchmarking architectural libraries.

Architectural libraries today are attuned to evaluating their services and facilities to ensure they are meeting the requirements of their users and stakeholders. This evaluation can include data on staffing, size, budget, and collections including print versus digital. Accessibility and inclusion are also increasingly at the core of what we do, from improving accessibility through resources and spaces to developing audiences and user participation. In addition to meeting the requirement of our stakeholders, benchmarking and knowledge exchange will ultimately strengthen the development and practice of contemporary art librarianship. Nearly 25 years ago a survey among architectural libraries in the USA was carried out by J.M. Brown and J. Connorton, partly funded by AR-LIS/NA. This talk examines the benefits and challenges of undertaking a similar survey that ARCLIB members can use as the basis for planning and evaluation, and aims to enlist collaboration in the project.

15.40 – 16.35 Nick Brown, Learning Resources Manager, Christie's Education

Approaches to diversity and globalization.

This session will look at some approaches to diversity and globalisation with reference to some recent initiatives in UK architecture and art libraries involving attempts to decolonise the physical and theoretical space of the library. The session would be framed by bringing together library and information science literature (particularly critical librarianship) with cultural studies approaches to 'race' and the legacies of colonialism. My intention is to foreground the role of student action and grassroots campaigns to driving change and to tentatively explore how moves to decolonise or significantly challenge inequitable structures will be met with institutional resistance and dilution. Examples from outside of traditional academic library contexts will be considered for some of the possibilities they may open up as well as the challenges they may pose.

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
